


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
he Greater Wausau Chamber of Commerce is bridging the community's bustling past with its vibrant future in its new office space within the historic Depot at 209 W. Washington Street in downtown Wausau. The Depot was built in 1899 on the Chicago North Western railway that transported people, including President Calvin Coolidge in 1928, into Wausau to make business deals and move lumber throughout the country. The railway still functions today on the Fox Valley & Lake Superior Rail System.

The Depot has undergone a complete remodel to serve as the proud home of the Chamber while serving as a community hub for collaboration with group meeting space and private work areas. Most importantly, the Depot is the first completed step in transforming Clark Island into an economic development campus, with the redevelopment of the historic WPS Powerhouse property next in line.

The WPS Powerhouse on Clark Island, right, was built in 1904 and played a significant role in supplying power for Wausau's fledgling businesses. The building remained in use as a power plant until 1946 and was used between 1979 and 2007 as offices for Wausau Paper.

With the Depot renovations now completed, the Chamber will turn towards reinventing the WPS Powerhouse.

The Ghidorzi team worked with the Chamber on the Depot project to achieve a design that would maximize the existing square footage of the building to improve circulation, establish visual connections throughout the building and enhance exterior views. Great care was taken to maintain architectural integrity while updating accessibility and functionality to current building code standards.

Preserving and accentuating historical elements were also top priorities in the redesign. Historical elements and artifacts were blended with modern accents to celebrate the industrial character of the area. For example, brick walls were exposed, ticket windows and doors were relocated to the interior, and the original passenger benches were refurbished to be featured as a functional interior focal points.

The finishing touches found in this re novated space were a particularly rewarding aspect of the project for the contractors and achieves an especially high touchpoint for Chamber members and staff. Antiques were salvaged out of old train stations, a favorite



being a railroad crossing sign equipped with marbles to reflect light. Original artifacts from the Chicago North Western line were tracked down. Million mile oak, reclaimed wood from the floorboards of train cars retired after traveling a million miles, was discovered and used to craft the bar and an adjacent table to make many more memories for years to come.

The Depot has always been a proud symbol of Wausau's entrepreneurial roots in the lumber industry, and the Chamber is breathing new life into that legacy with the Depot as its new headquarters.





f you're a local social media user, chances are you've stumbled upon WIFC's Dave Kallaway's mouthwatering food photos. The man knows how to show off meatloaf and mashed potatoes. But when the self-proclaimed foodie isn't cooking, what's his favorite dish downtown?

"I love Chef Tami's lobster mac and cheese at Townies. And she just started doing lobster rolls — very tasty," said Kallaway.

He's a big fan of Wausau's mushrooming culinary scene. "We own variety when it comes to food choices," said Kallaway.

Diverse restaurants are a significant part of the Wausau's appeal, contributing to its social fabric and economic prosperity. Whether they've been downtown since 1888, like The Mint Café, or they're a newcomer to the urban landscape like CHAR Grillhouse, restaurants help define the city's character by bringing people together and creating experiences.

"We have customers who've been coming in and getting the same Greek salad for more than 50 years," said Julie Luedtke, catering director of The Mint Café. "There are some who love to come in and order a cloverleaf dinner roll like when they came here with their grandparents."

In its 135 years, The Mint has seated countless patrons at their iconic green booths.

"We've hosted numerous artists who have been in town for various events, from meals with Aretha Franklin and B.B. King to those who come back every time they're in town like Lorie Line or Jim Belushi," said Luedtke. "We are honored and humbled to be a part of all of it, both the big-name artists and the loyal locals who join us for three meals a day."

Currently, Joe Pepowksi, owner of The Mint, is transitioning ownership to long-time employee Joe Schulz, who has been

instrumental in the continued success and growth of the restaurant and catering services. But don't expect many changes.

"Joe Pepowski will continue to be involved in daily operations. We know our success is partly fueled by the consistency of our

service and our menu items," said Luedtke.

With their renowned chefs and familiar staff, restaurants create memorable ties to the community and keep customers coming back for more. And the must-have menu items are varied. For some, it's oysters on the half shell at Ciao, fajitas at Jalapeno's, Pad Thai at Lemongrass or craft brews at Red Eye.

In addition to offering a range of cuisine options, restaurants support tourism and contribute to the local

economy by providing jobs and supporting other industries, such as agriculture and food production. Choosing to dine locally puts

TO SHARWARD TO SHA "In terms of impact, a study by Civic Economics found that local restaurants recirculate an average of 79% of their revenue locally," said Blake Opal-Wahoske, executive director of the Wausau River District. He added that downtown restaurant spending was \$6,649,779 in 2022 among the 24 downtown restaurants.

A thriving restaurant culture requires many ingredients, including a supportive community that values dining out.




"I have my American dream," Udara said. "And every day is another step to my American dream here."



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or decades, Wausau's riverfront has captivated the imaginations of many who envision its possibilities encompassing housing, recreation and commercial ventures. The picturesque area — stretching south of Bridge Street to Thomas Street — is a source of inspiration for residents and visitors alike. With its potential for development, the riverfront draws the attention of city planners, entrepreneurs and residents who recognize the opportunity to create something exceptional in the heart of the city.

Dotted along the riverfront are success stories of how public parks and buildings went from concept to creation, such as Whitewater Park, Riverlife Park, the Dudley Tower and WOW. Developers and dedicated citizens invested years and capital, bringing these worthy endeavors to fruition.

"The ongoing improvements to the riverfront are becoming increasingly important as more residents will depend on these amenities in the coming years," said Dave Eckmann, president of Wausau Opportunity Zone.

Here are some of the latest riverfront developments:

The Great Pinery Heritage Waterway is a shining example of Wausau's commitment to being a prominent water sports and recreation destination. The 108-mile-long water trail consists of

three rivers winding through central Wisconsin, starting at the Hat Rapids Dam in Oneida County and ending in Portage County at the Lake DuBay Dam. Hadley Landing on Clark Island will be a handicapped-accessible canoe and kayak launch for paddlers near downtown Wausau.

"It's part of an effort to enhance accessibility and make the whitewater course more recreational," said Bill Bertram, president of the Wausau and Marathon County Parks and Recreation Foundation.

The River Edge Parkway project is intended to link parks, walkways and multiuse trails along the Wisconsin River. The trail network is a conduit for alternative transportation, allowing bicycles, pedestrians other non-motorized modes of travel access to and from residential and commercial areas throughout the corridor.

"This has the potential to increase activity and commerce along the riverfront and attract young professionals to the area," said Eckmann.

Shared bikes are currently available between two stations — River Drive underneath Bridge Street near Riverlife Park and the other station south of the parking lots. Users can access the bikes for a minimal rate using an app on their smartphones and scan a QR code on the bike.





comprehensive update of the Master Plan for the Rib Mountain State Park was approved in late 2022 by the Wisconsin Natural Resources Board.

The approved improvements to the Park's Master Plan include a comprehensive network of new trails for hiking, mountain biking and for multiple use. Additionally, a perimeter trail encircling the mountain, reintroduction of camping, a new nature center and the expansion of climbing options are also planned. Two new areas for skiing were also approved, including a new lift and ski trails to the east of the existing Cupid Lift and a new lift and ski trails to the west of the Dasher Lift.

"I taught each of my daughters to ski at Granite Peak and it was a wonderful experience, but there were some challenges." said Matt Rowe, President of Ruder Ware LLSC and Chair of the Greater Wausau Prosperity Partnership. "Because of the topography currently found at Granite Peak Ski Resort, introducing young skiers to this outdoor activity is difficult. Expansion to the west would allow for more gradual, family-friendly runs and expose this wonderful outdoor resource to a wider range of Wisconsin residents. I'm confident that this can be done with minimal impact to the natural area at Rib Mountain State Park."

"The passing of the Rib Mountain State Park Master Plan with the additional approval of enhanced year-round access sets the vision

for the future of the state park and surrounding area." said Jamie Polley, Director, Wausau and Marathon County Parks, Recreation and Forestry. "The addition of mountain biking and the expansion of outdoor recreation opportunities further advances the county's desire to be an outdoor recreation destination. This Master Plan, in connection with local and regional park facilities, will improve the quality of life for residents, draw in visitors and grow the economic impact of central Wisconsin."

The economic impact of the full implementation of the Rib Mountain State Park Master Plan is projected to achieve an additional \$26 million in economic impacts annually.

"With the approval of the DNR's Rib Mountain State Park Master Plan, adding biking, skiing and trail options for outdoor lovers of all skill levels, it is becoming quite clear what makes our area unique; premiere outdoor recreation." said Tim White, Executive Director of the Central Wisconsin Convention & Visitors Bureau.

"The adoption of the master plan sets the course for our community to create a robust mountain bike trail network at Rib Mountain State Park, including lift-access mountain biking at Granite Peak Ski Area." said Aaron Ruff, President of the Central Wisconsin Offroad Cycling Coalition. "This is a historic step forward that will enable our community to become one of the premier year-round outdoor recreation destinations in the Midwest."





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
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ilestones are meant to be celebrated and the Monk Botanical Gardens' 20th Anniversary this year is no exception. Hundreds of community members of varying ages participated in diverse events and programs to commemorate 2023's special occasion.

Monk Botanical Gardens became incorporated as a non-profit in 2003, two decades after the concept of an educational botanical garden grew from an 'accidental trespassing' and Robert W. Monk III donated 20 acres to this vision.

"My Dad would be thrilled if he could see how the Garden was growing in many ways to be a success," said Robert's daughter, Marcia King. "He would love seeing the kids running around enjoying the outdoors, playing in the dirt, and splashing in the water like we did."

"Walking frequently through the Gardens, I am so proud of what

staff and especially volunteers have accomplished," said Ruth Schuette who, along with her late husband Marvin, donated the Treehouse feature and an additional 8.5 acres. "My message is to encourage everyone to visit the Gardens, watch for additional plans as proposed and invest as you are able!"

The Sprouts Garden Preschool program will continue to grow in the 2023-2024 school year. New offerings will include a full-day class for four- and five-year olds, and before and after-school care options for students. With nature at the heart of the program, teaching is based on high-quality early childhood education and environmental education practices. Students spend more than 80 percent of their time outdoors throughout the seasons with any indoor time taking place in a yurt classroom.

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

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Dog Parks in the Region


KRONENWETTER: Friendship Park in the north central part of the village includes a Bark Park.

MERRILL: A dog park is located at the Merrill Area Recreation Complex on Marc Drive.

RIB MOUNTAIN: Sandy's Bark Park can be found along Highway R at Oriole Lane. The park offers gravel trails and water and has expanded to a second, connected and fenced area.

WAUSAU: A dog park can be found behind the downtown post office on Fourth Street. Also, a pool party for dogs is held after the community swimming pools close each August.

WESTON: The Dog Park offers almost 40 acres adjacent to Kellyland Park. The park is fully fenced and dogs are allowed to run free within the park.

Population: 8,402

Flourishing neighborhoods, expansive homesteads and low tax rates shape Kronenwetter.

Located in northcentral Wisconsin, this community has become a haven for families looking for safe neighborhoods with room to grow, along with quick access to neighboring city amenities. Schools: Kronenwetter is split between the Mosinee School District and DC Everest School District. It's also home to the private Northland Lutheran High School.


Parks: The Village provides seven recreational parks, including one dog park. These parks feature baseball fields, athletic courts, play equipment and shelters available for rent.


Schools: Merrill is home to the Merrill Area Public School District and the Northcentral Technical College's Public Safety Center of Excellence.
